Ohlone Territory Lecture on May 23

Ann-Marie Sayers, the Tribal Chairperson of the Indian



Canyon Nation, will give a talk on "Ohlone Territory" on May 23 at 7:30 PM. Potluck will take place at 6:30 PM. Ann-Marie is also the Founder and Director of the Costanoan Indian Research, Inc., an author and an activist. The lecture is sponsored by the Saratoga Historical Foundation and will take place at the Saratoga Foothill Club at

20399 Park Place in Saratoga. As a Costanoan Ohlone, Sayers is a rare example of a Native woman who continues to live on her ancestral land. She grew up in Indian Canyon, the only federally recognized Indian country for over 300 miles from Sonoma to the coast of Santa Barbara. Sayers used the Allotment Act of 1887 to reclaim land that had been in her family for centuries in the Indian Canyon.

The potluck takes place at 6:30 PM—if you participate in the potluck, bring food to share and your own eating utensils. Coffee and tea will be provided.

Garcia interview Dr. Head. The sponsors and VIP guests will also see the first floor of his home where more art is located.


This is the largest event produced by the Saratoga Historical Foundation. The money generated will enable the organization to make many improvements.

The centerpiece of the program includes a “Give Thanks for Freedom” tableau created by Bill Allison and Christina Cagliostro. May is Preservation Month – Celebrate by Visiting New Historical Markers, Display, and Going on a Walking Tour

The Saratoga Heritage Preservation Commission launched National Heritage Month in May with a range of activities.



An educational display of structures on the Saratoga heritage inventory invites you to “Journey Into History With Heritage Preservation” and can be seen during this month in the Study Room of the Saratoga Library. Over 50 photos feature homes on the inventory, landmarks, and some that have National Register status. The history about each is included in the display. Heritage trees are also showcased along with a new category—point-of-interest markers. The display includes literature for listing your home, tree, or structure on the inventory or you can call members of the Heritage Preservation Commission for assistance.



Developer Craig Awbrey gave a presentation on May 6 on "From a circa 1890 Barn to an award winning office space" at the Saratoga Library. His presentation covered the repurposing of the Sam Cloud Feed and Warehouse plank by plank in the Saratoga Village. The 1890 building is now a successful commercial complex

called the Saratoga Barn. He noted that 49er Ronnie Lott was one of the first occupants and stayed for many years.

Two Point-of-Interest markers were unveiled during the Arbor Day celebration earlier in the month. This is a



new category for the Saratoga Heritage Preservation Commission. The first two point-of-interest markers cover the Blossom Festival, an event that ran successfully for 41

years—from 1900-1941 and that is unique to Saratoga. The marker is on the corner of Park Place and Saratoga Avenue. The second marker commemorates the Theatre



of the Glade which took place in the 1930s. Productions produced by legendary producer Dorothea Johnston in the outdoor amphitheater helped launch the career of Joan Fontaine and Olivia deHavilland

among other Saratogans. It also helped position Saratoga as a cultural mecca. The marker is located at 14355 Saratoga Avenue—across the street from the Blossom Festival marker. Plans are to have two more markers this year.

Last but not least—take a free, docent-led walking tour of the Saratoga Village on May 26. Meet in front of the Saratoga History Museum (20450 Saratoga-Los Gatos Road) at 1 PM---no reservation needed. The tour is a great opportunity to learn a little more about the history of the community.

Heritage Preservation Commissioners serve a term of four years and are approved by the City Council. Thanks to these commissioners for their work: Annette Stransky, Chair; Marilyn Marchetti, Vice Chair; Paula Cappello, Alexander Nugent, and Rina Shah.

Bill Gorman, a native Californian, is not only the top sales person in real estate each year since the 1990s but is consistently the best liked by his clients. Bill received the JCI Senatorship award and was the 50th President of the San Jose Chapter. He has contributed financial support to a diverse number of organizations in the Saratoga

Independence Day, Sunshine Williams for the Blossom Festival and Father Christmas during the holidays. You may not know that the native Pennsylvanian also has organized a local club for celebrating groundhog day and has an extensive collection of the critter.

Ann Waltonsmith, native Saratogan and former mayor, has earned a legacy of open space and trails during her time in office. The former psychologist has remained active in the community with volunteer and board work with the Saratoga Historical Foundation, Senior Center, Sister City, and Hakone Gardens and Estate. You may not know that Waltonsmith once



participated as Olympian Chis von Saltza for Heritage Day.

Marilyn White moved to Saratoga in 1955 and immediately jumped into community service. She’s received the honorary PTA Service Award, Citizen of the Year, and Soroptimist Award. She has served as the president of the Symphony Society, Chair of the Women’s Advisory Committee for West Valley College, President of the Parent’s Assistance League, organized the Networking Breakfast Club,



honorary member of the Saratoga Chamber of Commerce....Saratoga taiko drummer at the age of 90..... and the list goes on!


The Blossom Festival Returns!

Celebrating Memorial Day by Remembering Those Who Served Our Country



“Terrill” Barco, Jr. (1917-1997) moved to Saratoga in 1963 with his wife Margaret (1918-2005) and two daughters.

He was born in 1917 in Albay, Philippines, where his father was an officer in the Philippine Constabulary. The family moved to the United States when he

was young but returned for several years after World War I.

Barco returned to the states and settled in Gainesville, FL where he went to college. In 1939 he was selected as a Distinguished Military Graduate and was commissioned as an Army reserve officer in the field artillery. He entered active service that same year. Two years later he married Margaret.

During World War II, Barco participated in the amphibious invasion of Africa with the third Infantry Division and served as assistant anti-tank officer on General George Patton's staff. Barco also participated in the first assault wave on Sicily. He later served in four campaigns in France and Germany. For his war service, Barco received numerous decorations, including the Bronze Star Medal with oak leaf cluster, Army of Occupation Medal and World War Victory Medal. Upon returning to the United States, Barco wrote the first comprehensive tank gunnery manual for the US Army. In various later military positions, he was senior American adviser to the Greek Army Corps, chief of supply and facilities for the U.S. Army Reserve and ROTC, commander of the 6th Tank Battalion in the Korean War and commander of the 2nd U.S. Armored Cavalry Regiment in Fort Knox, Ky. Following his Army retirement in 1963, Barco opened Barco Realty in Saratoga and was an active member of the community.

Margaret lived in many places around the United States and Asia as Terrill pursued his military career. A talented and versatile artist, she was an accomplished painter, sculptor, jeweler, seamstress and ceramicist. As

a young woman she studied to be a classical pianist and was offered a music scholarship to college, but instead studied fashion design. After her younger child went to college, Margaret worked for 10 years for the County of Santa Clara Juvenile Probation Department.
