This is the McWilliams House next door to the Saratoga History Museum. Read the plaque to find out who lived here and what his job was. In 1865 homes did not have faucets for running water, bathrooms, or electricity in the house.

Pumping water

Since there was no water in the house, every day someone had to fill a bucket for water so:

-the family could wash their face and hands each morning

-the chamber pot could be rinsed if it was used

-the father could shave his whiskers with a razor blade

--the mother could use water for cooking-the family had water to drink

-the family could wash their hands before each meal

How does this kitchen stove work? If you took away everything from your kitchen that needs electricity or natural gas, what would be left?




These are some of the kitchen tools used in the late 1800s. Which ones are similar to those we still use today?








In a one-room schoolhouse, children of different ages were together with one teacher. Teachers were very strict, and the rules must be followed.
